

Illinois – Youth Suicide

Statistical Impact



According to the latest CDC's WISQARS National Data Reporting (2019):

- Suicide is the 4th leading cause of death for ages 10-14 in Illinois.
- Suicide is the 3rd leading cause of death for ages 12-18 (middle and high school ages) in Illinois.
- Suicide is the 3rd leading cause of death for college-age youth ages 18-22 in Illinois.
- When examined as an age group 10-24 comparison, suicide is the 3rd leading overall cause of death for Illinois. In Illinois, every 2 days on an average a young person (ages 10-24) is lost to this "Silent Epidemic" of youth suicide.

Illinois 2019 Youth Risk Behavioral Survey (CDC): (Most Recent Released Report)

When young people were asked in Illinois:

"Have you experienced the feeling of hopelessness and sadness for a constant period of two weeks or greater during the past twelve months (possible beginning of clinical depression)?" 36.3% answered YES or over 1 out of every 3 young people. Compared to Nationally – 36.7% (depression is a leading cause of suicide) This equates to 223,671 youth in the state that will have these feelings in the next 12 months *if nothing is done differently. "Have you seriously considered suicide in the past twelve months?"* 19.0% answered YES or almost 1 out of every 5 young people. Compared to Nationally – 18.8% This equates to 117,073 youth in the state that will consider suicide in the next 12 months *if nothing is done differently. "Have you made a plan to attempt suicide in the past twelve months?"* 15.6% answered YES or almost 1 out of every 6 young people. Compared to Nationally – 15.7%

This equates to 96,123 youth in the state that will make a plan *if nothing is done differently.*

"Have you attempted suicide in the past twelve months?" 9.0% answered YES or almost 1 out of every 11 young people. Compared to Nationally – 8.9% This equates to 55,455 youth in the state that will make an attempt in the next 12 months *if nothing is done differently*. This is an average of 151 per day.

*Projected using the National 2019 YRBS, which surveys grades 9-12, and the Illinois 2017-18 school state population numbers. If these results were also applied to grades 7 & 8, where suicide is also a major health issue, the impact numbers would be higher.
